The role of equalities leader

Everyone in the nursery has a responsible role to play to ensure an inclusive ethos is embedded throughout. We treat this as a whole team approach. At the learning tree day nursery, we ensure we:

- Welcome all children and families into our setting
- Have a non-judgemental approach to all children and families
- Ensure all children are well supported and treated as individuals that attend our nursery
- Ensure all children with additional needs are given the appropriate support by our staff and SENCO
- We will work closely with every child's family ensuring we liaise with parents on a regular basis about their child's individual progress and development.
- Ensure all children's cultures and diversity is celebrated and included in our practice
- Support children and families who may have English as an additional language.

The Equalities leader will take a lead to:

- Ensure that all staff understand the equalities policy and practices are monitored throughout the nursery.
- Be a role model by encouraging children to respect and value others.
- Work alongside the nursery manager to ensure that resources reflect diversity and promote positive images for the children.
- Challenge inappropriate practices and attitudes if encountered.
- Attend any training that the nursery manager may feel will help you benefit your role and feedback to the staff team.

The Learning Tree Day Nursery Inclusion and Equality Policy

Equality, Inclusion and Valuing Diversity Policy Statement of intent

We will ensure that our nursery is fully inclusive in meeting the needs of all children, particularly those that arise from their ethnic heritage, social and economic background, gender, special educational needs, ability or disability.

Our setting is committed to anti-discriminatory practice to promote equality of opportunity and valuing diversity for all children and families.

Aim

We aim to:

- provide a secure and accessible environment in which all our children can flourish and in which all contributions are considered and valued
- include and value the contribution of all families to our understanding of equality and diversity
- provide positive non-stereotyping information about gender roles, diverse ethnic and cultural groups and disabled people
- improve our knowledge and understanding of issues of anti-discriminatory practice, promoting equality and valuing diversity
- make inclusion a thread that runs through all of the activities of the nursery

Method

In order to meet our legal duties, promote equality and inclusion in our setting and value diversity we follow these procedures:

Admissions

- Our setting is open to all members of the community.
- We advertise our service widely.
- We reflect the diversity of members of our society in our publicity and promotional materials.
- We provide information in clear, concise language, whether in spoken or written form.
- We base our admissions policy on a fair system.
- We ensure that all parents are made aware of our equality and diversity policy and all other relevant policies.
- We do not discriminate against a child or their family, or prevent entry to our setting, on the basis of colour, ethnicity, religion or social background, such as being a member of a Travelling community or an asylum seeker.
- We do not discriminate against disabled children. Consideration needs to be given to any reasonable adjustments required to include any child who may have a disability or special educational needs.
- We develop an action plan to ensure that all individuals can participate successfully in the services offered by the setting and in the curriculum offered.
- We take action against any discriminatory behaviour by staff or parents. Displaying of openly discriminatory and possibly offensive materials, name calling, or threatening behaviour are unacceptable on or around the premises and will be dealt with in the strongest manner.

Recruitment:

All members of the interview panel will be committed to the inclusive practice set out in this policy and will have received appropriate recruitment training in this regard.

- Application forms will be set out along with a copy of the equal opportunities monitoring form. Applicants are welcome from all backgrounds and cultures. Posts are open to all, subject to appropriate experience and qualifications.
- We may use exemption clauses in relevant legislation to enable the service to best meet the needs of the community.
- The applicant who best meets the criteria is offered the post, subject to references and DBS checks. This ensures fairness in the selection process.
- All job descriptions include a commitment to valuing equality, inclusion and respecting diversity as part of their specifications.
- We monitor our application process to ensure that it is fair and accessible.

Staff:

It is the policy of The Learning Tree Day Nursery not to discriminate in the treatment of individuals. All staff are expected to co-operate with the implementation, monitoring and improvement of this and other policies. All staff are expected to challenge language, actions, behaviours and attitudes which are oppressive or discriminatory on the grounds as specified in this policy and recognise and celebrate other cultures and traditions. All staff are expected to take part in equality and inclusion training.

Training

- We seek out training opportunities for staff and volunteers to enable them to develop anti-discriminatory and inclusive practices, which enable all children to flourish.
- We ensure that staff are confident and trained in administering relevant medicines and performing invasive care procedures.
- We review our practices to ensure that we are fully implementing our policy for promoting equality, valuing diversity and inclusion.

Curriculum and environment

The curriculum we offer at The Learning Tree Day Nursery encourages children to develop positive attitudes about themselves as well as to people who are different from themselves. It encourages children to empathise with others and to begin to develop the skills of critical thinking.

The environment is accessible for all visitors and service users. Reasonable adjustments have been made to accommodate the needs of disabled children and adults.

We do this by:

- Making children feel valued and good about themselves
- Making adjustments to the environment and resources to accommodate a wide range of learning, physical and sensory impairments
- Making appropriate provision within the curriculum to ensure each child receives the widest possible opportunity to develop their skills and abilities.
- Positively reflecting the widest possible range of communities by enhancing the choice of resources
- Avoiding stereotypes or derogatory images in the selection of books or other visual materials
- Celebrating a wide range of festivals
- Creating an environment of mutual respect and tolerance
- Differentiating the curriculum to meet children's special educational needs
- Helping children to understand that discriminatory behaviour and remarks are hurtful and unacceptable

- Ensuring that children learning English as an additional language have full access to the curriculum and are supported in their learning
- Ensuring that children speaking languages other than English are supported in the maintenance and development of their home languages

Valuing diversity in families

- We welcome the diversity of family lifestyles and work with all families.
- We encourage children to contribute stories of their everyday life to the setting.
- We encourage parents/carers to take part in the life of the setting and to contribute fully.
- For families who speak languages in addition to English, we will develop means to ensure their full inclusion.

Food

- We work in partnership with parents to ensure that the medical, cultural and dietary needs of children are met.
- We help children to learn about a range of food, and of cultural approaches to mealtimes and eating, and to respect the differences among them.

Monitoring and reviewing

- To ensure our policy and procedures remain effective we follow the Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) statutory guidance and review our policies annually to ensure our strategies meet the overall aims to promote equality, inclusion and valuing diversity.
- We provide a complaints procedure.
